Ethical approach to the impact of COVID-19 measures:


- Medical ethics
- Security ethics
- Economical ethics
- Ecological ethics.
- Freedom of opinion and expression

Reality:

- There are more than one "pandemics" happening at the same time. COVID, racism, marginalization, economic inequalities, unequal access to education, discrimination, situation of migrants, - Syndemics.
- Vulnerable groups, (migrants, refugees, minorities, poor, women), are suffering disproportionally in the pandemic with higher mortality rates, mental health, economic impact, greater exclusion
- Question of access to education is a key one.
- Real challenge in the tension between positive and negative freedom (human rights, need for public health controls, etc)
- There is a risk that COVID is being used to justify human rights abuses and restrictions of basic freedoms.
- COVID shows the value of clear and independent information, but also the danger of misinformation / disinformation.
- The strengthening of (new and old) borders.

Lessons learned:

- Assistance vs. distance
- Individual responsibility and rights
- Right of Health
- Emergency laws and democracy
